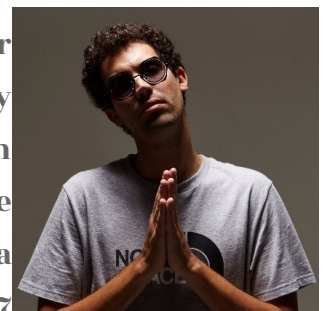


René Magritte
